rriving in the Holy Land to find Jerusalem covered by a blanket of snow was a surprising and inspiring experience. Verses of 'In the Bleak Mid-winter' came to mind as we wound our way along streets busy with Jews, Muslims and Christians taking advantage of the rare occasion to come out and play in the snow. This magical spectacle, however, belies the tension and mistrust that permeates the Holy City. Tempers flare at the slightest challenge to the 'Status Quo,' and frustrations between religious and cultural groups regularly result in violence. Jerusalem is without doubt an incredibly diverse, beautiful and immersive city, however the harmony is fragile.

We've all seen 'fragile' written boldly on packages containing easily broken objects, urging us to exercise caution and to handle with care. That is the reality of everyday life for the people of Israel: everything they have built and worked for balances on a pedestal that could quite easily come crashing down at the whim of a harsh word or a dispute over pencil marks written on a map by British governors 60 years ago. The stones sigh and life goes on.

If you asked an Israeli or a Palestinian what they hope for in 2013 some will answer: 'security,' others 'prosperity' and perhaps more than a few would be heard to say 'freedom.' It strikes me that regardless of religion, culture or political affiliation, everyone in the Holy Land wants to continue with their way

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of life free from persecution, war and anxiety – everyone wants to live in peace.

When I reflect on my experience in the Holy Land I can draw a number of less dramatic parallels with my life and the lives of those around me: All of us do plan, set ourselves goals, pursue our chosen career paths, raise our families, and build our homes. Occasionally things don't work out the way we

hoped that they would and then we turn to resolutions and 'new starts,' or we become frustrated. Peace of mind and contentment are elusive and fragile.

Returning once more to the Holy Land it is amazing that with the heavy weight of historical hangover and religious difference there is any peace at all, yet all over the country there are signs of hope: Community proj-

ects between Jewish and Arab young people; peaceful places of prayer maintained protected; and customs honoured, and traditions respected. Ultimately, the peace of the Holy Land has at its source the love of God. So, before you make a list of resolutions and worries for 2013 ask yourself: 'Do I love God?' and 'How can I bring his peace to others?' Start with that and who knows what this year will bring.




The programme of reflection and workshops centered in the theme of Advent. Fr Tom came along with us too.
