Those who have faith have fun

My dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ

aster is one big joke. Amen. OK ... I guess I should explain that. What is a "joke"? A joke is an "activity characterised by good humour." Can you think of a better way to characterise the resurrection of Jesus than as an "activity characterized by good humour"? The Resurrection was God's activity of the highest and best humour! G.K. Chesterton once wrote: Angels can fly because they take themselves lightly. Never forget that the devil fell by force of gravity. A good joke is the closest thing to divine revelation . . . They who have the faith have the fun. Easter is a good joke!

Its purpose was simple:

Easter reveals God as no other celebration has ever done. Only God can draw the greatest good out of the greatest evil. Of evil, Saint Thomas More once wrote, "The devil ... the proud spirit ... cannot endure to be mocked." The people of the Middle Ages understood this and decided to have the last laugh on evil. In the Middle Ages some communities would throw a laughter party on Easter Sunday.

Its purpose was simple: to celebrate God's triumph over evil. People would come back to church on Easter Sunday afternoon, which is the end of the Triduum, for Vespers and Benediction services. As a reward to the faithful after many serious Lenten homilies, the priest would insert funny stories, poems, and even off-colour jokes into his sermon and would draw moral conclusions from them. ancient Russian

Orthodox tradition was to sit around the Easter dinner table telling jokes. Like those 13th-Century Germans, they even told them in church. Why? Because they felt that way. After all, they were imitating the cosmic joke that God pulled on Satan in the Resurrection. Satan thought he had won, but then God raised up Jesus from the dead and had the last word. And the world laughs at Satan's chagrin. Laughing at the Devil even has a name in theological tradition; it is called the risus paschalis, "Easter laughter". This was the way people rejoiced in the triumph over Death that Easter embodies. Death had been a disturbing thing. For much of human history people have had an attitude toward it somewhat like Woody Allen's: "It's not that I'm afraid to die. I just don't want to be there when it happens," he once said. Jesus' Resurrection turned the tables on Death. It was a cosmic joke! Where death had once been something to shudder at, the Resurrection shows, as one of the kids put it: "When you die, God takes care of you like your parents did when you were alive ... only God doesn't yell at you all the time." German Protestant theologian Jurgen Moltmann,

"The Easter laughter is rooted in the wholly unexpected and totally surprising 'reversal of all things.' God had brought this reversal about by raising Christ.... The expectation was for cosmic death, but what comes is eternal life." We Scots can be dour and serious. Praying and laughing seem to be far apart in our culture, but at Easter they come together, as they do throughout scripture. In Psalm 126, the Hebrews praised God with mirth: "Then our mouth was filled with laughter and our tongue with shouts of joy" (Ps. 126:2). Jesus promised laughter to those who are favoured by God: "Blessed are you who weep now, for you will laugh." (Luke 6:21) It seems the ancients were much more aware of the relationship between prayer and laughter than are we. Our word joke derives from ancient Umbrian word iuka, which means "prayers"! So, Easter is a joke, a great big cosmic joke, in which God turns the tables on Satan, turns the tables on evil. turns the tables on death! That should put a smile on our faces! Christ is risen! He is risen indeed! Alleluia! The first Holy Week, by the plan of God, was the most important week in the life of Jesus Christ.

NIEDZIELNA REFLEKSJA NAD SŁOWEM BOŻYM ... Bezradność przy grobie

To, że ktoś umarł, można przeżywać, cierpiąc, ale to, gdy ktoś przestaje istnieć, gdy dematerializuje się jego ciało, albo znika w niewyjaśniony sposób, moze doprowadzić do dezorientacji graniczącej z szaleństwem.

W pierwszych chwilach tego odkrycia dramatem nie była już śmierć Jezusa, ale to, że On zupełnie zniknął, jakby Go nigdy nie było! Nieobecność Boga jest przerażającym doświadczeniem. Peter Maurin was a French social activist, theologian, and co-founder of the Catholic Worker Movement. After spending time as a De La Salle Brother in France, and homesteader in Canada he moved to New York. He was greatly inspired by the life of St Francis of Assisi and engaged in direct action for and with the poor.

He educated and instructed Dorothy Day in Catholic social thought, and his own programme intended to 'build a new world in the shell of the old'. Maurin encouraged Day, a trained journalist, to publish the Catholic Worker newspaper. His own contributions styled as Easy Essays reflecting his thoughts on a wide range of issues.

Maurin's model of urban houses of hospitality to care for the destitute, rural farms to educated city dwellers on agriculture, and roundtable discussions to clarify thought and initiate action remain the basis of the Catholic Worker Movement. Peter Maurin died on 15 May 1949.

FUNDS FOR WAR MEMORIAL AND CHURCH RENOVATION SCHEME

Members of St John's Catholic Church, Perth, have organised a Grand Bazaar and Fancy Fair for the purposes securing funds in aid of the church war memorial and restoration scheme. The Bazaar, which is being held in the City Halls, had a delightful send off vesterday, and before the last purchase is made tonight a handsome sum should be drawn. (December 1924)

There was a large attendance at the Opening Ceremony, at which Bailie Hunter presided, and accompanying him on the platform were Rev. Father Slattery, Rector of St Mary's Monastery, Kinnoull; Father Bird: Father McDaniel: Rev. P. R. Landreth; the Hon. Mrs Stirling of Keir; Mr and Mrs P. P. Leyden; and Mr and Mrs Begg.

The Hon. Mrs Stirling, who declared the Bazaar open, said it was a pleasure to be asked to take part, in however small and humble a degree, in any good work in which they were engaged. That day they were engaged in two works, because she understood that that bazaar was intended in the first place for the renovation of He thanked all those outside the Catholic Church, and in the second place for the provision of a War Memorial to those dear to them who lived in that parish, and who fell in the Great War.

It was difficult to dissociate those two objects, united as they were in one enterprise, and she felt that in themselves either would have been sufficient in providing such a strong motive for everyone connected with the Bazaar to work for its success. She was sure that everyone in the parish was working hard to ensure that success. Underlying all these memorials was the double object, the one of commemorating and keeping green the memory of those who went from that war, and the other of incit-

ing and stirring and training the young generations who came after to have the same high motives - courage, endurance, patriotism, and religious feeling-that inspired those who went to their deaths in the Great War

They could not have a War Memorial more beautiful than that Memorial which was to be connected with their Parish Church. She hoped that those who wished Christmas presents would purchase them at that bazaar. With all her heart she hoped that the Bazaar would be a great success, and she had great pleasure in declaring it open.

The Hon. Mrs Stirling was thereafter presented with a beautiful bouquet of Flowers by Miss Cathie Fraser. Rev. Father McDaniel, in returning thanks to the Hon. Mrs Stirling for so graciously performing the Opening Ceremony, said that the Memorial was to take the form of a beautiful stained glass window of the Resurrection, with a suitable inscrip-
