


## St John the Baptist Catholic Church-The Mother Church of Perth

Liam McArthur MSP has **published a bill** to legalise assisted suicide in Scotland. The bill, which proposes allowing assisted suicide for those aged 16 or over who are terminally ill, mentally competent and who

wish to die, will be debated and scrutinised by the Scottish Parliament in the coming months and will eventually be voted on by MSPs in a free vote (not along party lines). The Bill refers to assisted dying, but this is a euphemistic term which doesn't accurately describe the reality. Assisted dying is already practiced by our health professionals and organisations, in the form of palliative care. An accurate term for what the Bill seeks to legalise is assisted suicide. It is a law which will allow a doctor to provide a patient with a lethal cocktail of drugs to kill themselves. Here are just a few concerns about the Bill proposals:

The Bill defines 'terminal illness' as follows: "an advanced and progressive disease, illness or condition from which they are unable to recover and that can reasonably be expected to cause their premature death". No life expectancy is stipulated in the Bill and the definition means it could cover chronically ill and disabled people, and people with anorexia. Doctors would be asked to assess and declare that there is no coercion or pressure involved in a person's decision to choose assisted suicide. This is an almost impossible task, especially for a decision of such magnitude.

Registrars will be required to record the underlying disease or condition as the cause of death, not the ingestion of a lethal cocktail of drugs. Assessing doctors will not be obliged to refer applicants for a specialist assessment if they have doubts about terminal illness or capacity.

In a pastoral letter, <u>Called to Care, Not to Kill</u>, Scotland's Catholic bishops have described the proposals as "dangerous" and urged the Catholic faithful to contact their MSPs. **Please pick up this letter.**
